SOMEWHERE ALONG THE LINE, city tours changed. They did here in the Northwest, anyway. Gone are the days of large roving packs of semi-interested tourists shuffling behind a megaphone-mouthed tour guide exalting a brightly colored flag or similar shame-beacon. Today's next-generation city tours have become the perfect melding of pertinent facts and lively discourse between the tour guide and a smaller, more intimate group—balanced and beneficial infotainment.

Culinary tours, in particular, offer insight, history and the overall culture of a city through the cuisine that defines it. They are like city tours with benefits. You might enjoy a good art walk, but you're guaranteed to like it more with a small bite and a glass of wine or cocktail. They are typically led by experienced and passionate guides working for companies that have established relationships with a number of purveyors, so waits and lines are circumvented. As a result, even groups of complete strangers more often than not morph into groups of mobile compatriots bound together by food, drink and discovery. They are as

enjoyable for locals as they are for out-of-towners and should be considered almost mandatory for foodies that find themselves in the Northwest. Here are four of our favorites:

#### Portland: Alberta Arts District Food Tour

The city that has become one of the culinary capitals of the U.S. has no shortage of excellent tour options. But the one that shines as the ultimate showcasing of both the city's food and soul, is the Alberta Arts District Food Tour. This on-foot excursion by Eat Adventures Food Tours delves deep into the poignant history of Portland's premier arts district. The tour visits murals and works by both local and world-renowned artists, as well as a diverse array of the neighborhood's notable eateries. It's an outing that simultaneously gives guests the cultural and culinary backstory of the city via the tangible evolution of its art and food.
